A number of visits have been made across to the island. It has had a share of light damage from the high water seen on the river this year (see the club's facebook page for some photographs). I'll take this opportunity to thank Roger and Gerry who keep an eye on our island and let us know as soon as there are any obvious issues. The water damage is all manageable and fixable, but we really do need a good turn-out at the working parties on 8th and 15th March. Our Bosun, Andy Juric, has a list of work that will keep us busy for a few hours!

We have also had our first Committee meeting of the year. Amongst the many items discussed, we spoke of some interest being shown by some potential new members, so we look forward to our ranks "swelling" in the months to come. We also look forward to welcoming Simon Price's boat, *La Luna*, to our moorings in the not-too-distant future.



As well as the two working parties, before our next scheduled newsletter, we have the Fitting Out Supper on 14th March and a New Members Training Day on 5th April. The training day is being organised by Andrew Barwick and is a chance to learn (or remind ourselves) how to use the dinghy and the generator.

From the Committee:

While the winter so far hasn't been too cold, we have had high water levels and the island has been covered more than once. Thanks to Gerry Taylor and others who have kept us posted with photos by email and on Facebook. One boat was briefly caught on the bank by its stern. Another broke free and was recovered at Teddington. It is very important that boat lines are in good condition and mooring lines correctly positioned (see page 10 of the new Club handbook). Those who have been over to the island tell me there is a layer of silt to be cleared and the shed has been inundated. So please put **Sunday 8th March** in your diary as the first **Working Party** of the year. We need lots of willing hands to help clear up.

Many of you will have seen the new day boat at the end of last season. After a couple of months in the snug shelter of the Clubhouse she is ready for necessary renovation so that she becomes available to members for trips during the boating season. Dom will be undertaking much of this work supervised by our master craftsman Ray, sparing time from his own winter project. Anyone interested in helping should please contact Dom.

We continue to press the Environment Agency to repair the wooden edging on the Middlesex side of the island. The timbers will cause a hazard to navigation if they break away from the bank, which is likely as the bolts rust away. The hard concrete edge and protruding bolts risk damaging any boats that

moor against the bank including our own members' boats. Unfortunately, the river conditions over the last couple of months haven't helped as the EA equipment is stranded upstream. Andrew Barwick has been in touch with other contractors in case we need to arrange for the work to be done – hopefully at EA expense. We are also keeping an eye on a couple of willow trees on the island which are showing signs of weakening.

You should have all received a copy of the **SBC Handbook** for 2020 which includes the Programme of Events. Duty Officers are listed on pages 4 and 5. Please note the dates in your diary and the usual request: if you are unable to be Duty Officer on the date allocated, it's imperative that you find a substitute. Many thanks to Dominic and AJ for all their hard work pulling the material together and arranging publication of the handbook. Let Linda know if you haven't received a copy; there will be some spare copies in the Clubhouse.

There will be new **Members' Training** on the ferry and Club equipment (including those who need a refresher) on Sunday 15th March and Sunday 5th April. Please note the dates if you are not sure how to start the generator for example. We have contact with an RYA qualified instructor who is willing to go out with people on their boats. One person asked last time I mentioned it: are there any others before I contact him please? There will obviously be a cost, but I can see if he will make a reduction if several people book.

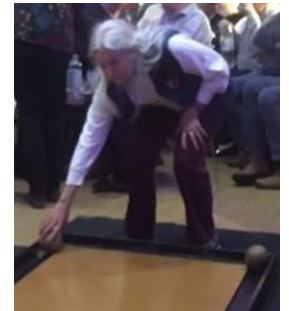
All went smoothly, in no small way down to the excellent organisation by Linda, and it was a great occasion.

Skittles Match at Byfleet Boat Club



On Saturday 1st February, representatives of the Small Boat Club took part in the 2020 Skittles Match. There were four teams: (Byfleet Boat Club, Weybridge Mariners Club, Thames Scouts Cruising Club and ourselves) battling it out for the coveted wooden Skittles Trophy. The game was played on an indoor skittles lane with the traditional 9 pins, and 3 wooden balls (one of which was so old, battered and holed that it risked being categorized as "block" rather than "ball"). Each player was to bowl twice during the evening and their score for each round (with a possible maximum score of 27 per round) was then passed through a long and technical algorithm, devised by the BBC, to arrive at an "averaged score".

Our club was represented by Ray (team coach, physio and chief strategist), ("press ganged" Captain), Dom, our striking partnership of Linda and Gay, and myself.



The first half was slow and measured, with the teams showing mutual respect for each other. Decent scores all round punctuated by two moments of excitement as the opposition achieved scores in double digits.
