Shoulders for the work he has done on the Middlesex side and around the creek. He has continued much of the fencing work started earlier in the year, painted a lot of it and both supplied and fitted new AstroTurf. Rob Fountain also deserves thanks for tidying up the other half of that leg, power hosing it down and filling holes. This part of the island probably gets the majority of the footfall during the summer months because of the pontoon, canoes and swimmers, so AstroTurf seems the logical covering. We will investigate at the next Committee meeting whether we can fund additional AstroTurf there as well as discussing what might be done on the up-stream stretch. Much of the other maintenance work I mentioned in the last newsletter has been completed but we will likely need a "focus WP" to help do the jetty...keep an eye out for a call for help.

The wildlife continues to thrive on the island. A few weeks ago it looked as though the pair of swans by the shed had hatched one cygnet, but it hasn't been seen for a few days now. The other pair of nesting swans on the slipway hatched, we think, four cygnets (although this seems to now only be three). Yesterday the whole family were away most of the day but came back in the late afternoon so, even though it may look as though they have moved on, they are just doing swimming lessons and are still around. Please give them space and don't disturb the nest.

On the "admin" side, the EA have now contacted us to open up discussions about the island rent, which is in line with our lease agreement. I expect these discussions to go on for a couple of months but hope that any cost increase is kept to the minimum. Our finances are in a good place, our treasurer and his predecessor took into account an increase by way of the mooring fee increments so as to cushion any blow. Our main source of income is membership and mooring fees, our other source of "income" is your participation in managing and maintaining the club.

You may have noticed a few emails that have been forwarded from the ATYC (Association of Thames Yacht Clubs). They represent all of the Clubs on the Thames from Southend all the way west. Amongst other things, they act as our combined interface with the Environment Agency and have been lobbying the EA on things such as lock maintenance, lock staffing, water provision, river maintenance and so on. At the AGM this May there were signs that the association might have to discontinue because of the lack of volunteers for Committee positions. Thankfully this has been resolved and the ATYC continues. I believe they are a body that some might not know its value until it ceased to exist. So good news.

In discussions with the ATYC I came across a training plan that leads to a "Thames Boating Certificate". It is a modular, "self-study" approach that covers the basic boating skills needed to boat on the Thames. It isn't a substitute for RYA courses, but is

a good framework for those new and casual boaters who might want a "check list" of things. It comes in the form of booklet which contains guidance, advice and a personal progress log. Those following the plan can reach out to other members for help and guidance. For those that see it through, we can get an ATYC assessor down to put them through their paces and, if successful, award a Thames Boating Certificate. All for £5! I'll bring along a bit more information at the Family Fun Day, or you can email me directly.

As for off-island matters, we would all like to congratulate our former President and Commodore James for his resounding success in the recent local elections and we wish him well in the role.

Next: for your diary! As the dust settles on the Jubilee weekend our thoughts now move to the **Family Fun Day** on Sunday **19th June**. ½ pint beer jugs and "land based" water craft of various shapes and sizes to last a while!




Sails.

We know that if we, in our powered boats, come across a boat using one or more sails for propulsion, we need to give way. There is also a sail (the white triangle) on our Club burgee as a nod to the days when the club was predominately a sailing club. The earliest record of a ship under sail comes from an Egyptian vase from around 3,500BC, Vikings are thought to have sailed to North America 1,000 years ago, and improved sail design has increased exploration, trade, migration and recreation.

There are many type of sails, and many variants of each but the most basic types are:

- 1. Mainsail the biggest and flown from the main mast
- 2. Mizzen flown from the second mast
- 3. Jib Sail (or foresail) flown in front of the mast from a forestay
- 4. Topsail flown above the mainsail or the jib
- Spinnaker a special sail design to maximise the wind force when coming from behind

Sails are raised or hoisted by ropes or wires referred to as halyards and then controlled by ropes or wires referred to as sheets.



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
